Lent, 2010

Dear Members and Friends of Gethsemane:

Why do people put off until tomorrow what could be enjoyed today? Why do people hold onto gift certificates and wind up not using them? Why do we wait until someone is about to move away before taking them out to eat? Why do we wait until the last minute to redeem frequent flier miles, or take years to get around to visiting local landmarks that are on another's tourist itinerary?

Or, to put it another way, why *don't* people "carpe diem"? That is, why don't we "seize the day", a phrase popularized in the movie Dead Poets Society. Social scientists tell us that when there is no immediate deadline, we're liable to put off whatever (even the pleasurable) this weekend, because we assume we'll be less busy next weekend, or next summer, or whenever. Yes, you can procrastinate pleasure!

As the season of Lent approaches, I'm inviting all members to "carpe diem".....to "seize the day"....that is: to let God speak to you through our time together in WORSHIP both Sundays and the Wednesday midweek services; to "seize" the moment for repentance and prayer, and renewal of your spiritual life; to give up procrastinating and avoiding God's call and His mission to save the lost all around us.

Now I know that not everyone associates the above with "pleasure". Yet our heavenly Father does. Luke 12:32 says "Fear not, little flock; it is the Father's good *pleasure* to give you the Kingdom...". And what is that Kingdom? It is wherever God rules, and wherever He rules, *peace and joy are the norm* (Romans 14:17). He is a God who gives. He has much to give you.

The prophet Jonah is getting prime-time attention this Lent, in our devotional booklets, and through the special Lenten midweek series. He procrastinated obedience, but the God of the "second chance" turned him into a successful missionary in spite of himself.

Please join us, beginning Ash Wednesday, Feb. 17th, (3 or 7pm) as we "seize the day" for reflection, forgiveness, and to give pleasure to our heavenly Father.

KNEADED AND RESHAPED

I'm writing this because it is still so painful to speak what is on my heart. Were I to try to express it, it would only come out as tears.

During the last week of Eppie's life I knew what lay ahead, but couldn't fathom the enormity of it. That precious week we talked about her death, our tears mingled no differently than how we were joined together as one flesh in marriage on May 29, 1971.

I promised her I would do everything to place her cats ("beasts"), as I so fondly called them, in humane no-kill shelters. Then there was my leg.

Like the making of bread with the pounding, kneading, rolling and twisting, my life had been slammed down on the cold marble of the pastry chef and I was utterly dependent on the outcome. I was shoved in the oven of grief to feel the hot blast of emptiness.

The ingredients of my life: who I was, my purpose in life, how I expressed it, goals, dreams, aspirations slowly faded away over these past eight years and completely extinguished in one instance of Eppie's last breath.

All good pastry chefs look into the oven to see if the dough is rising, is the outcome what was anticipated, is it ready to so gently be placed on the cooling rack to assume its new purpose of nurturing and sustaining?

Like that bread, I have begun that process of being reshaped and it has only been in the loving hands of you that I have begun to come out of the blast furnace of what felt like utter destruction.

You telephoned, you visited, you cooked (hurray), you disposed of my garbage, you sent cards, you hugged me, you washed my underwear and socks, and you became like my Eppie in her healthy days.

The oven timer is still clicking off the minutes because I'm not done yet. I still have to withstand some heat to fully rise, reshaped with a new purpose and reason for being. That's part of the recipe and the Master Chef is overseeing it all.

When the oven shuts off, I will be ready to be consumed. I pray that that will mean sustaining you with whatever crumbs I have to offer as you have nurtured and loved me until that day when we are all brought to the same table of our Lord.



HYMNS WE LOVE TO SING

"When I Survey The Wondrous Cross" LSB 425 & LSB 426

***When I survey the wondrous cross
On which the Prince of glory died,
My richest gain I count but loss,
And pour contempt on all my pride.***

Words by Isaac Watts, 1674-1748
Music (LSB 425) by Lowell Mason, 1792-1872
Music (LSB 426) by Edward Miller - adapted from Second Supplement to Psalmody in Miniature, London, 1778

Isaac Watts was born, July 17, 1674, at Southampton, England. He died November 25, 1748 at Stoke Newington, England. He is buried at Bunhill Fields Cemetery, London, England

Watts' father was a Nonconformist imprisoned twice for his religious views. Isaac learned Greek, Latin, and Hebrew under Mr. Pinhorn, Rector of All Saints, and headmaster of the Grammar School in Southampton. Isaac's taste for verse showed itself in early childhood, and his promise caused a local doctor and other friends to offer him a university education, assuming he would be ordained in the Church of England. However, Isaac declined and instead entered a Nonconformist Academy at Stoke Newington in 1690, under the care of Thomas Rowe, Pastor of the Independent congregation at Girdlers' Hall; Isaac joined this congregation in 1693.

Watts left the Academy at age 20 and spent two years at home; it was during this period that he wrote the bulk of his Hymns and

Spiritual Songs. They were sung from manuscripts in the outhampton Chapel, and published 1707-1709.

The next six years of his life were again spent at Stoke Newington, working as tutor to the son of eminent Puritan John Hartopp. The intense study of these years is reflected in the theological and philosophical material he subsequently published.

Watts preached his first sermon at age 24. In the next three years, he preached frequently, and in 1702 was ordained as pastor of the Independent congregation in Mark Lane. At that time he moved into the house of a Mr. Hollis in the Minories. His health began to fail the next year, and Samuel Price was appointed as his assistant in the ministry. In 1712, a fever shattered his constitution, and Price became co-pastor of the congregation, which had moved to a new chapel in Bury Street. It was at this time that Isaac became the guest of Sir Thomas Abney. He lived with Abney (and later Abney's widow) the rest of his life, mainly at Theobalds in Hertfordshire, then for 13 years at Stoke Newington.

In 1728, the University of Edinburgh awarded Watts a Doctor of Divinity degree.

While there are two music versions of this hymn, LSB 425 & 426, my personal choice is the music of LSB 426.
